Human Trafficking as it relates to Domestic and Sexual Violence

Sexual Abuse Can Be Physical and Non-Physical

The effects of sexual abuse suffered in childhood extend throughout the life course of a person. It affects a person's self-esteem, their ability to develop healthy boundaries and trust, and sustain healthy relationships. It is important to talk about sexual abuse to help adults who may be questioning the experiences they had as a child. It is essential to believe the person when they are able to tell. Children need to know that they can speak openly to a trusted adult and that they will be believed. Victims of sexual abuse should always be reassured that they are not responsible for what has happened to them.

Sexual abuse occurs whenever one person dominates and exploits another by means of sexual activity or suggestion. Abusers can be indirect in their abuse by fondling and professing love or grooming a child to take on an adult role. This grooming can also involve special attention from an adult in exchange for unwanted sexual favors. Others use threats and scare tactics to coerce a child. Physical contact plays a role in most sexual abuse; however, it does occur and causes great harm even when no touching is involved. Sexual abuse perpetrated on a child can involve physical contact, non-physical contact, and/or exploitation. Non-touching sexual offenses include:

Exploitation: Exposing children to pornographic material or using children in pornography **Exhibitionism**: Deliberately exposing a child to the act of sexual intercourse or masturbating in the presence of a child

Exposure: Exposing oneself in front of a child for sexual gratification

Understanding the devastating effects of abuse and the dynamics of the abuser is a first step in healing. The effects are long lasting and affect the victim's self-esteem and create interpersonal problems that carry into adulthood. Victims often suffer from psychological and physical problems. These physical complaints can manifest as medically unsupported headaches or back pain. Many victims exhibit self-defeating or acting-out behaviors such as self-mutilation, suicide attempts, promiscuity, and may abuse drugs or alcohol.
